Early Intervention

- 88 Families were served in 5 counties.
- Partners with Department of Developmental Disabilities, Action for Children, Bright Beginnings, Help Me Grow, and many audiologists.
- Language deprivation is a common concern with 0-3 years old being the window of learning language. Early Intervention works with families to communicate with their infant and improve language acquisition.

OYO Camp

- 100 youth who have hearing loss attended OYO camp
- Over 50 staff supported these youth all were fluent in sign language
- Communication modes during camp: sign language, oral, total communication, and gesturing.

Peer to Peer

- Over 700 hours of support were provided to Deaf individuals ages 14 – 85.
- 10 refugees from Nepal who are Deaf were supported to learn American Sign Language, integrate themselves into American culture, learn about shopping, and understanding money management in the USA.
- Worked with individuals who are Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing and DeafBlind to understand banking, money management, accessing utilities, explaining written documents, filling out on line forms, teaching about available technologies, and explaining their rights under the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Empowering individuals to advocate for themselves

DEAF YOUTH PROGRAM (DKTC and CAREER OPTIONS)

- The Deaf Youth Program helps over 50 youth who are Deaf or Hard-of-Hearing learn about themselves and develop interpersonal skills with the goal of helping them reach their fullest potential to become productive adults.
- Deaf Kids & Teens Club provides opportunities for youth ages 9-18 to interact with successful Deaf adults and develop positive self-esteem and confidence, while having a great time. The program is a partnership with the Columbus Hearing Impaired Program, supported by a grant from the Dorothy E Ann Fund.
- Career Options program, located at Dominion Middle School, educates middle school students on career choices. encourages youth to consider college or trade school to assist in becoming gainfully employed upon graduating high school.
- Successful Deaf Professionals are brought in to give presentations to inspire youth in different career paths.
